



Charles McComas Robb

December 21, 1946 - August 2, 2021

Charles McComas Robb, age 74, of Philadelphia, died August 2, after a brief illness. Mac, as he was known to his family, was born in December 1946 in Catonsville, MD. He was a graduate of West Virginia University and, later, Temple University, where he obtained a Master's Degree in social work. He was preceded in death by his parents, Charles Winfield and Minnie Belle Robb of Cooksville, MD.

Mac committed his life to serving others.

Upon graduating from Glenelg High School, Glenelg, MD, 1964, Mac travelled, over the objections of his fearful parents, to Mississippi where he volunteered to register Black residents to vote.

He also took part in social justice activism during the 1960's on the campus of West Virginia University. On one occasion, Mac entered a campus tavern that was known to deny service to Blacks and ordered a beer. At the prearranged time, a Black student accomplice entered the bar and ordered himself a beer. After the Black student was denied service, Mac offered him his beer, prompting the proprietor to eject them both from the establishment. Mac left the bar and proceeded directly to the mayor's office where he reminded the elected official of the possible consequences of not enforcing the Civil Rights Act of 1964.

Mac then served the families of his adopted home city for 30 years with the Philadelphia Department of Human Services. When his first boss at DHS mistakenly called him Charlie, Mac decided not to correct his new employer and, as a result, was known as Charlie Robb for his entire professional career. He initially worked as a social worker before being promoted to supervisor. Charlie, who was proficient in American Sign Language, then assisted families with children who had special needs, especially the deaf. He was promoted to the Resources and Development Unit where he was the first administrator to work with children diagnosed with HIV. He then moved on to become the Administrative Services Director, handling tech support, logistics, furniture, supplies and any move from building to building. Charlie was the go-to person for anything that was needed at the agency. He did this Herculean task always with his usual good nature and efficiency. He retired in March 2002.

Mac had many interests and talents. As a young boy, he wowed the audience at the

Howard County (MD) Fair with his vocal rendition of "The Little Red Schoolhouse," a musical performance which earned him the blue ribbon. An award-winning stained glass artist, Mac refused to sell his works, instead donating several pieces to charity auctions or giving them as gifts. He enjoyed listening to soul, doo-wop and bluegrass music. Mac was a lifelong learner and an avid reader of history and other non-fiction books. He also studied Spanish. Mac enjoyed attending live tapings of The Price is Right and was a fan of the classic television series, The Honeymooners.

Along with his spouse, Bill, Mac befriended two elderly female neighbors and provided weekly care for them for decades. To be regaled by Miss Kelly and Mrs. Funk's colorful stories about their career as Vaudeville performers was the only repayment Mac and Bill ever requested.

Mac undertook researching his family genealogy, an endeavor which became a multi-year odyssey. By the conclusion of his investigation, his printed family tree spread across his parents' basement floor. He also spent years painstakingly transcribing all seven decades of his great, great-grandfather McComas' daily diary.

During the second part of his life, Mac found a spiritual home with the Chenrezig Tibetan Buddhist Center of Philadelphia. He came to the Center at its original location well over 10 years ago. At the Center his presence and actions radiated loving kindness from the very start. He became a helper, offering everything he could, no matter how menial the task. When the Center bought an abandoned building to renovate in Northern Liberties, Mac took it on as if he were the general contractor, making sure he was doing whatever was needed, when needed. He was an expert member of the team to bring the structure from its dilapidated state to the beautiful spiritual haven it has become. Mac saw the need for nature and spent months working with the city to have a tree planted in front of the building. He singlehandedly built the Center's library. Mac visited every Buddhist Temple in the Philadelphia area, from all traditions and immigrant communities, making connections everywhere.

After the Center opened at the new location, Mac became a regular volunteer next door at Mt. Tabor AME Church in their Love Kitchen where he helped provide meals for the homeless and others who are food insecure. He also assisted with the Church's winter clothes drives.

One of Mac's last earthly acts was to make sure that extra dog food went with Spiritual Director Ven. Losang Samten on his trip to India to feed more homeless dogs on the streets of Ladakh.

Mac (Charlie) was deeply loved by his family as well as his extended family and will be missed.

Mac is survived by his spouse of 45 years, William Ludwig, of Philadelphia; son, Benjamin (and Heather) Robb of Sykesville, MD; brother Bob Asmann (and Jan) of Okemos, Mich; nephew Bobby (and Allison) Asmann, of Milwaukee; and niece Beth (and Todd) Asmann
